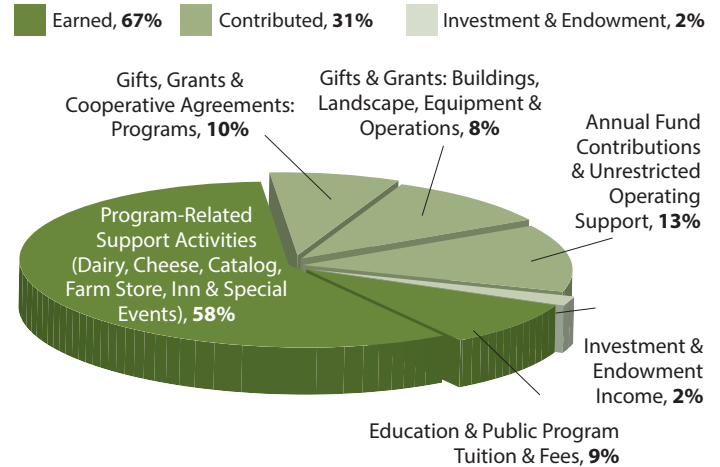

Land stewardship, endowment, campaign gifts, campaign capital improvements and other expenditures, as well as a total consolidated depreciation of \$853,493 is included in above table. 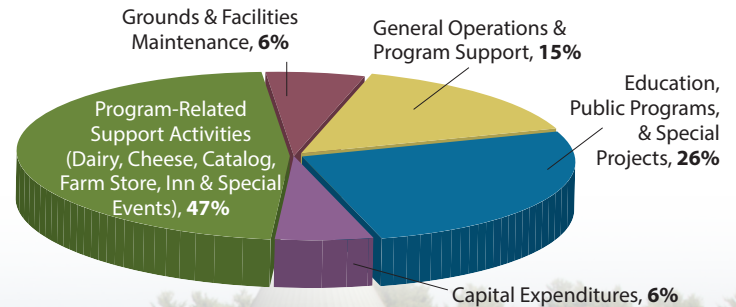
Consolidated Annual Operating Revenue & Expenditures

Total Sources: \$10,029,100



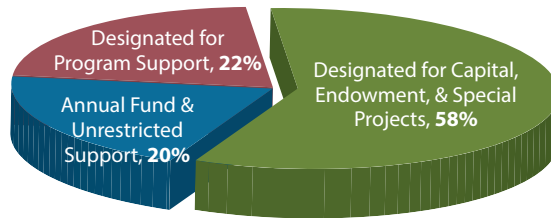
Total Uses: \$10,029,100

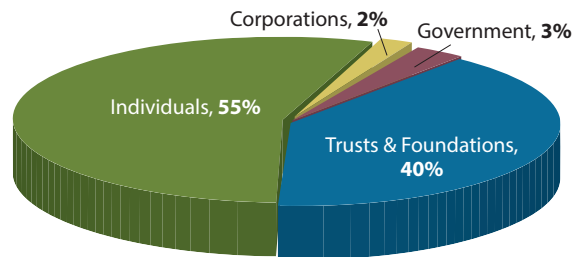
Total Contributions by Fund

Contributions to all funds totaled \$4,840,023 in 2016 (\$3,420,260 in 2015).



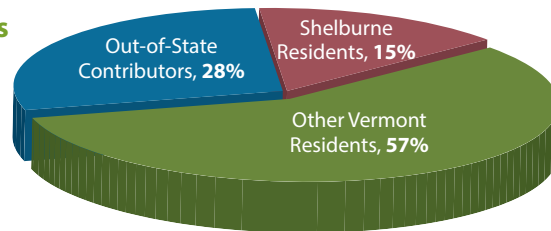
Total Contributions by Source

Shelburne Farms depends upon support from diverse private and public funding sources.



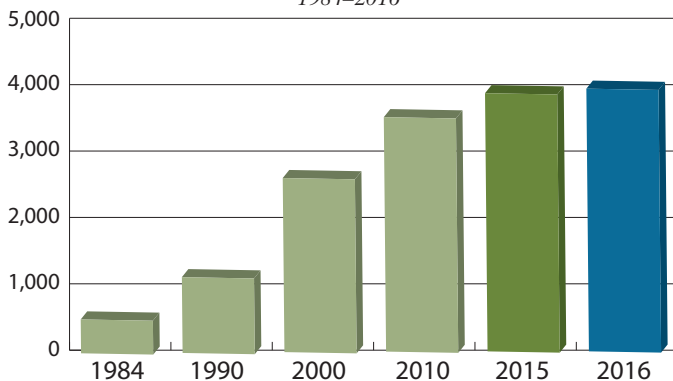
Contributor Demographics

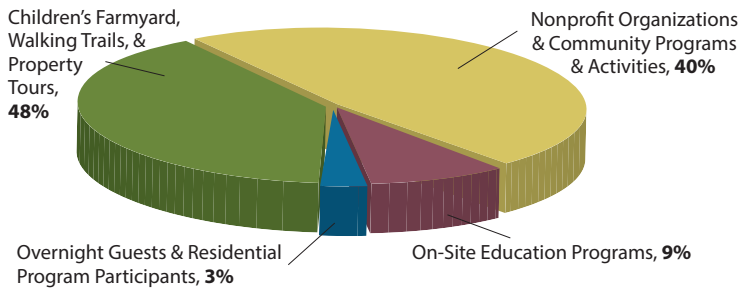

87 individuals or couples have notified us that they have included the Farm as a beneficiary of their estate plans.

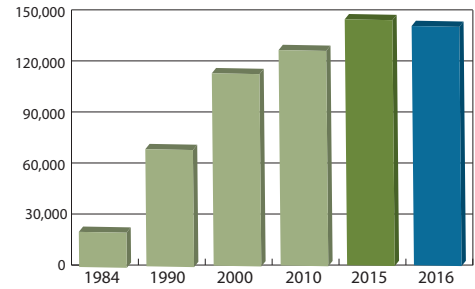


Program & Visitor Attendance

Shelburne Farms served 142,448 people in 2016 through education and visitor programs, and by making its campus available for use by others.



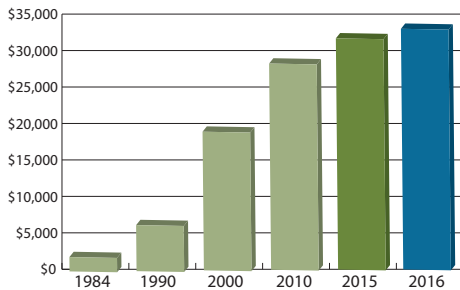
Total Attendance
1984–2016



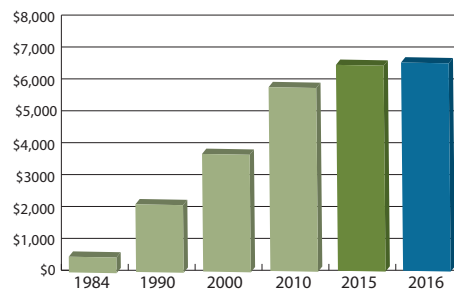
Financial Trends, 1984* – 2016 (In thousands of dollars)

*1984 was the year the property of Shelburne Farms was bequeathed to the nonprofit.

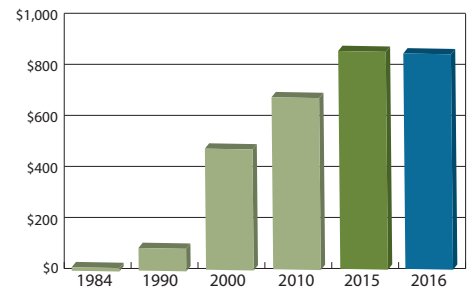
Total Assets



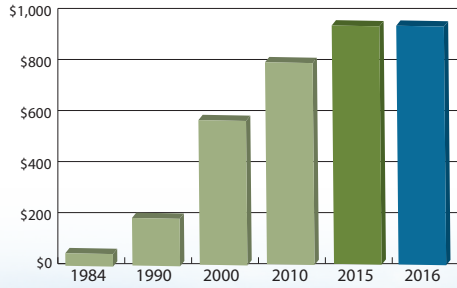
Earned Operating Revenue¹



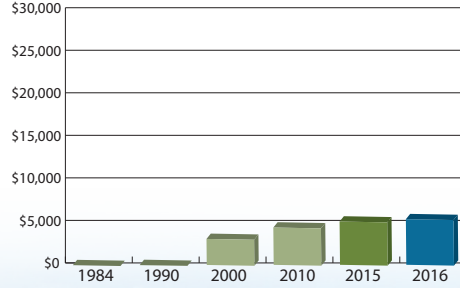
Depreciation



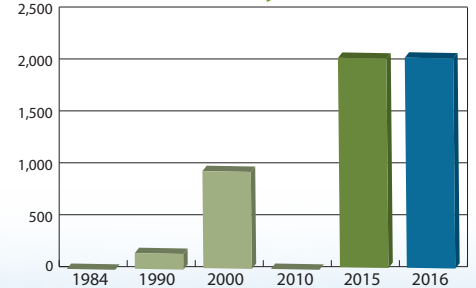
Annual Fund Gifts & Grants²
